

Do kids with ADHD do better if you teach them coping skills along with taking Strattera?

Does Strattera help children with ADHD to do better at school?



Strattera is the only non-stimulant medicine which is FDA approved for the treatment of ADHD in children.

The Center for Children and Families is looking for boys and girls who have been diagnosed with ADHD and are between the ages of 6 and 12 and are interested in **FREE** medication and counseling. Even if your child has not been formally diagnosed with ADHD, they may be eligible.

All children

receive Strattera (no placebos)
are followed by a medical specialist in ADHD (for six months) and
are monitored at their schools (for a full semester)

Some families also will receive an 8-week behavior therapy course:

- The Parenting Class focuses on helping parents manage ADHD symptoms at home, including things like how to get homework done, manage problems with siblings and deal with oppositional behavior
- The Child Class emphasizes teaching children social skills in order to promote better friendships and reduce aggressive behaviors
